CRISIS DESCRIPTIONS

ENGLAND 1066

In January of 1066, King Edward the Confessor, the last king of the House of Essex, died without an heir to the English throne. Such a phenomenon led to a power vacuum and placed the monarchy into a volatile position. Many leaders from different parts of Europe, particularly the Anglo-Saxons and the Norwegians, scrambled for a place on the throne, which led to heightened tensions among the claimants and even among Anglo-saxons themselves. Furthermore, the various Earls of England were divided along familial lines, and the crisis heightened these existing conflicts. Who will ultimately take the English throne? How will the contenders reconcile their respective interests to the throne? The English monarchy is at the brink of collapse, and it is up to you to maintain it.

KOREA 1945

This committee will explore from a Korean perspective the forces resulting in the unintentionally long-lasting division of Korea. The time between World War II and the Korean War was a dynamic and uncertain one, with personalities and movements migrating and flowing in no certain direction. This crisis will be divided into two committees, one with individuals initially residing in the North of the country, and one in the South, simultaneously wrestling for control, battling external influence, reforming a colonized region, and attempting to unify a people.

THE CLINTON ADMINISTRATION

Two years after Bill Clinton's resounding electoral victory, the 1994 midterm elections ushered in a wave of Republicans to the House and the Senate, giving Republicans a majority in both houses. This "Republican Revolution" presented significant challenges for the Clinton Administration in terms of passing policy, and pitted the White House against Congressional leadership in several significant policy battles. Beyond policy, congressional Republicans also sought to take President Clinton to task for many of his personal actions. This committee will explore the competition and compromise of two groups of people who were both trying to do what they thought was in the best interests of the American people.

THE GENERALITAT OF CATALONIA

Between 1936 and 1938, Catalonia was embroiled not only in the Spanish Civil War, but in Social Revolution. Radical anarcho-syndicalists, who for decades had been a powerful force on the streets of Barcelona, abandoned their opposition to governmental participation and joined the government within Catalonia's regional parliament, the Generalitat, which had previously been controlled by the Republican Left of Catalonia (ERC), a Left-Republican and pro-autonomy faction loyal to the Popular Front government in Madrid. Meanwhile, Catalonian workers and farmers rose up, seized many of the means of production, burned down their churches, and began operating many important economic sectors of Catalonia as collective enterprises. This new Generalitat, divided between itself and unlike any other legislative chamber known to history, found itself faced with many perhaps impossible tasks. Defending Catalonia's increasingly precarious position from Franco's armies. Maintaining Catalonian autonomy while co-ordinating both militarily and politically with the government in Madrid. Maintaining domestic order in the face of factional tensions. Attracting international support. And ensuring the welfare of the Catalonian people and the Catalonian economy during these unknown times. Delegates will become the Generalitat, or other factions' special representatives thereto, in a tale dotted with peasant militants, internecine political operatives, patriotic Catalonians, poets, artists, philosophers, radical feminists, and romantic volunteers from across the globe.

CONFERENCE POLICIES

POSITION PAPERS

All delegates will be expected to submit a position paper, and they are required to be considered for an award. Each crisis has its own position paper guidelines outlined in its respective background guide. Generally, the papers should reflect the priorities, concerns, and strategies that your assigned characters would advocate in committee, drawing from information provided to you in the background guide as well as outside sources. You are expected to email them to your crisis directors by February 28th unless otherwise noted in the background guide. You should expect to receive feedback on the paper at least 2 days before the start of the conference.

BADGES AND PLACARDS

Delegates must wear their BUCS name badge at all times while attending BUCS. Your badge serves as admission to all conference functions, including social events. For badge or placard replacements and revisions, please notify your committee chair or contact help@browncrisis. org.


HARRY'S BAR AND BURGER: 121 N. MAIN ST.
